# Sherrard teacher leads efforts to provide classrooms with emergency kits

Sherrard students, parents, and teachers put together a trauma kit for every classroom, office and bus in the school district, a total of 156 emergency packs - in May.

Sherrard Junior High students with Special Education Teacher Michelle Rolsch began making plans to establish a trauma kit program for the district after she got the idea from volunteering last summer with North Scott Community Schools.

"I thought it was a good idea... So we have the stuff to do what we need to do before the ambulance gets there." Said seventh grader JoLinda Walsh who was instrumental in planning. Seventh graders Quincy Gasper, Landon McGonigle also helped organize the effort.

"This is what they need," Rolsch said the students gained valuable life skills by making phone calls, coordinating supplies, counting the cost and double checking orders.

The life savings packs are intended to be used until first responders arrive on the scene. They include corban, gauze, cpr masks, gloves, tourniquet, trauma shears, quart size baggies and sharpie markers.

When Rolsch received \$300 from WQAD's 'Pay It Forward' sponsored by Ascentra Credit Union in January - she knew right away she would put that funding towards trauma

"I thought, 'this is a sign, now I can start."

High School teacher Tammy Crippen nominated her for the award, "It's an unending part of her goodness that she spreads to kids. I knew immediately she wouldn't use it for herself. I had seriously hoped she was going to get a massage or something," laughed Crippen.

School Resource Officer Mike Mendoza had already been working on a trauma kit program for the school. When Rolsch told him her plans - they were able to work together.

"It just happened to be that right at the same time I was coming to her and she had the idea - not one person can do it, that's what it comes down to," said Mendoza.

Through their collaborative effort Rolsch and Mendoza raised the \$2,000 needed to get all the supplies for the kits.

"It just fell into place - it was supposed to happen," said Rolsch.

Donations came from Sherrard School District Board of Education, Sherrard Boosters, Rock Island County Sheriff's Department FOP, Mercer County Sheriff's Department FOP, Sherrard Fire Department, Sherrard Community members who donated at the Pancake Breakfast, School board member Kim DeBlock and family, and countless unnamed others.

"I'm very proud of our community," said Rolsch of the outpouring of support, "We're getting donations from people - we're not even sure who to actually thank."

The kits were done May 16 - surpassing Rolsch's goal to have the kits ready to go by National Stop The Bleed day, May 23.

"The word is spreading - it just takes that one person to say, 'ok I'm going to do this.' It's doable and it's not hard."

Now, she's reaching out to area school districts and businesses to help coordinate the same efforts. So far, Rockridge School District has expressed interest in having help from Rolsch.

"I'll do what they need me to do. I've already done the leg-work, it's really easy. Don't spend your time spinning wheels when it's already been done," she said.

Rolsch said the rural districts especially, should have the trauma kits in every classroom. "We do have quite a large area to cover and if there is an emergency at a building it's going to take a lot longer for the first responders to get to them."

District employees will receive training on how to use the items in the kit. Superintendent Alan Boucher said admin can rest a little easier now that the trauma kits are in place.

"We're always trying to look for ways we can be

proactive - and this was certainly an example of that. We appreciate all their efforts in identifying the things that would be important to have in the kits."

"If something happens we'll be ready...I hope we never have to use these kits," said Rolsch.

# Students install little free library outside Winola Elementary School

In the morning, April 3, Sherrard fourth-graders and high school students worked together to put in a little free library outside of the Winola Elementary School.

Carly Minch, fourthgrade teacher at Winola, tasked her students early in the school year with a problem based learning project.

Fourth-grade students researched and designed the unit — then high school students built, painted and installed the free library at Winola Elementary, open to all area children.

The collaborative effort included high-school students in various workshop classes, taught by ag instructor John Rasty. Ag construction and technology students developed the initial construction, and it was completed by students in woods class. The designs on the sides were made out of metal by the Metal Fabrication 1 and 2 classes.

Rasty explained the process to the fourth-graders.

"We're not very good artistic painters," he said. "Instead of painting on the pawprint, we used a computer program ... we put computer drawings into a machine that cuts it out of

metal.

Minch's class researched and worked together in groups before presenting their ideas to the whole class.

"The kids did a lot of research, and what's going to best serve the population of Winola, and because this is a hub where fifth- and sixth-graders get off the bus — maybe some of them would utilize it as well," Minch said.

Each year Minch's fourth-grade class completes a problem-based learning project. In year's past, her students, along with a Sherrard Elementary class, re-imagined their computer labs. They created innovation labs that now include coding and problem-solving technology.

"We really try to focus on what can we do to give back to the community around us. We want to make Winola the best place possible and give as much as we can," Minch said.

Winola Principal Kari Roberts ways Minch does a great job teaching kids using the problem-based learning model.

"I think it's exciting in two ways: first, that it's real life learning, they're

actually thinking of something to apply — it makes the learning more authentic and fun for them.

"I like the collaboration with the older students too, to do something for the community," she said.

Students brought in their own donated books to start the library. Minch said she had books ready to replenish in case it got low.

Minch said her students saw the importance of making sure any child that would like to have a book had that opportunity.

"I like that other peo-

ple can read if they want," said Javin Jones, Winola fourth-grader. He enjoys reading and wants to make sure every child has access to books.

Maysie Hubbs agreed: "Kids that don't get to read books at home can come here — and they're free. They can just grab a book and read it."

Evelyn Weakley said they were sure to include chapter books "because some kids don't always have books." She enjoys reading and helping her community.

Weakley said each

group's designs for the unit were different. They had different ideas for how many shelves should go in — and if it should have a place on the sides to hold books.

The fourth-graders cheered when the high-school students arrived to complete the project that day.

"I think both groups were excited to work together," Rasty said.

"These guys are excited to be able to help them out — they're excited to have high-schoolers helping them out."

Sherrard School District dedicates memorial scoreboard

#### Luxmore's legacy and his passion for baseball won't soon be forgotten

The Sherrard School District dedicated the Bryant J. Luxmore Memorial Baseball Scoreboard before Wednesday's 9-8 win over Knoxville.

Almost seven years since CPL Bryant J. (B.J.) Luxmore, 25, New Windsor, was killed in action in Afghanistan June 10, 2012 - the memorial fund established in his honor donated the state-of-the-art scoreboard to the baseball program at Sherrard High School. It was installed last summer, this will be it's first full season.

Luxmore was a 2005 Sherrard High School graduate who played both baseball and football there, and went on to play college-level baseball at Monmouth College and Illinois College where he graduated in 2009. He then joined the Army in 2011 as an infantryman assigned to the 1st Battalion, 64th Armor Regiment, 2nd Brigade Combat Team, 3rd Infantry Division.

The Bryant J. Luxmore Memorial Fund is supported by contributions from sponsor and golfers who attend the annual golf outing the third Saturday in August. Last year 36 teams were sold out two days of opening online ticket sales, said his mother, Brenda.

"We've had so much

support with the past several years of our golf outing. We knew we wanted to do something to give back to the community," she said.

She thought the scoreboard was fitting, since both her boys love baseball and they wanted to firmly establish B.J.'s legacy in Sherrard athletics.

Brother, Brock Luxmore was a 2002 Sherrard graduate, he remembers playing ball with B.J. at their New Windsor hoem. His eyes distant, looking somewhere into the past, he said, "There's been some good memories, we've played a lot of games... between the two of us we won a lot of games - at the football field next door, and the baseball field.

It's always good to be back," he said.

He said B.J. was somewhat of an introvert, "Honestly, he probably wouldn't like it too much. He was one of those quiet guys that didn't like a whole lot of publicity or spotlight," he laughed.

Brock said he and his family are glad to have a permanent memorial at Sherrard's Joel Brunsvold Complex.

"Baseball for B.J. was his passion and what he enjoyed the most. We're extremely happy with how it turned out... Tugs at your heart a little," he said.

Brock said the organization donates four scholarships yearly to Mercer County and Sherrard baseball and football players - and Illinois College Baseball.

"BJ is a hero to the com

munity, staff and students. We have many people that knew him from his playing days and know his family, and want to continue to keep his legacy fresh for all," said Applegate.

The scoreboard has his name, Bryant J. Luxmore and the memorial logo

across the bottom. At the top left is the Sherrard Tiger mascot. It was installed where the almost 20 year old board previously stood, the new board is significantly larger.

"It's just nice to have his name up there so people won't forget... They will remember his life here, his legacy of what he did and his sacrifice also. We're very proud of it," said Brenda.

Parents, Leonard and Brenda Luxmore still reside in New Windsor - and are still part of the Sherrard community.

B.J. left behind a wife, Jamie, and son Lane. He was posthumously promoted to Corporal, awarded the Bronze Star, Purple Heart and Combat Infantry Badge.

Winola Principal Kari Roberts told the volunteers, "Thank you for keeping (the program) alive for us, the kids love it, they The long-running program was started by Ramona McMeekan (now retired) teacher at Coyne Center Grade School in the 70's. It then transferred with her to Winola Elementary and began again the second year after the school was annexed to Sherrard with the help of Arlene Duty and Katie Hall (retired teachers).

Around 20 volunteers were paired with the first graders at the beginning of the school year. Each Wednesday morning the duo reads together for 20 minutes. Another 20+ volunteers are ready to sub in case someone can't make it.

The 60 first graders each get 20 minutes of one-on-one time to read out loud with their partner.

She said the difference in the kids reading skills from the beginning to the end is, "amazing."

"There are some that really need the extra help... They're just sweet kids."

Lawson, 86, raised four children that all graduated from Winola High School. Her husband graduated from the school when it was Viola School District, and they currently have several great grandchildren attending each school in the district. One of her grandchildren even works for the district as a Speech Pathologist, Amber Bruning.

FIrst grade teacher, Julie Burns, has been with the
